ABOUT THE LETTERS PROJECT





ArtsUP! LA and Returning Soldiers Speak believe in the transformative power of story. Through dialogue, workshop, and performance, veterans, first responders, and their families gain new understanding about themselves and the world around them. Empowered, they seek integration back into the community and at the same time the community gains new perspective and understanding about what it means to serve.

Our intent is to give voice to veterans who have experienced war as well as to show how the different wars affected and continue to affect their relationship to the military. In addition, it is our hope that the audience will gain new understanding about our veterans and what it means to serve in uniform.

Drawing from the rich and complicated tapestry of history, the correspondences between those deployed and those at home serve as the inspiration behind an original theatrical production, "Across Time: Love and Humanity During War." These letters, spanning from past wars and conflicts such as the Civil War to Operation Freedom's Sentinel (1 January 2015 to 30 August 2021), provide a poignant window into the hopes, fears, and observations of those who served.

OUR VETERAN PLAYWRIGHTS

Our veteran playwrights, each with their own experience in the United States Armed Forces, bring authenticity and depth to the stories of their fellow veterans through their visions and playwriting. Spanning across different conflicts and wars, our veterans infuse their personal experiences and insights into their respective narratives.

Through this live performance, audiences will witness the myriad of humanity encapsulated in these historical letters, original plays, and monologues written by living veterans of the United States Armed Forces. This production offers a unique perspective complexity on the human aspect of war, spanning from the Civil War to the beginning of The War on Terror.

Miguel Berlingeri

Ralph S. Carlson

Ralph S. Carlson, Emeritus Professor of English at Azusa Pacific University, was trained in Hanoi Dialect Vietnamese at the Presidio of Monterey, October 1968-April 1970. Following Security School at Goodfellow Air Force Base in San Angelo, Texas, he served a year in Vietnam both as an 04B Translator-Interpreter, and as 98G Voice Intercept Operator with the rank of Specialist 5th Class, returning stateside in October 1971. The GI Bill saw Carlson through advanced degrees in English literature and linguistics at the University of Oregon. He taught English writing and literature courses at Cal State San Bernardino, 1978-1981. At Azusa Pacific University, 1981-2014, he taught English literature, grammar, linguistics and creative writing/poetry classes. During his career and in retirement, Carlson has made short-term English workshop and other aid-related trips to China and Vietnam with ECF International. Over 440 of Carlson's poems have appeared in journals, including the Returning Soldiers Speak anthology; Northwest Review; The Texas Review; The Cape Rock; The Nebraska Review; The Hawai'i Review; War, Literature and the Arts; Vietnam Generation; Sunstone; and Vietnam War Generation Journal.

Joe Luis Cedillo

Joe Luis Cedillo is a left-handed Chicano playwright, director, actor, dramaturg and sound designer specializing in new plays, devised work, community-based, site-specific and intersectional work. He's a former Life Guard and Cancer survivor who attended the University of Iowa's MFA Playwrights' workshop. In another life, he was also a 3rd ANGLICO Marine Corps Paratrooper/Field Radio Operator/F.C.T. Team Chief from '92 to '99 based out of Terminal Island with 36 static line jumps including his Thai Jump wings courtesy of Cobra Gold '95. He started his Theatre career in the 99-seat theaters in Los Angeles before landing as the former Literary Manager/Production Dramaturg for Houston's Alley Theatre. He's the former Associate Artistic Director for Luis Valdez's El Teatro Campesino and current Associate Artistic Director at Texas State's Black and Latino Playwright's Celebration helping develop new plays. He's been commissioned by the LA History Project and NYC's MET Museum and Houston's MFAH Museum. He's a two-time Runner up for the Kennedy Center's ACTF National Latino Playwriting Award, 2016 Bay Area Theatre Critics Circle Sound Design Nominee, and Runner-Up Kendeda playwriting Award. Benjamin Fortier

Benjamin Fortier grew up in Northern Rhode Island. He enlisted the Marine Corps Reserve and within 10 days of high school graduation, he was standing on the yellow footprints at Parris island. He served as an infantry team member with 1st Battalion, 25th Marines in Fallujah, Iraq in 2006. His latest book, Phantoms, was awarded the 2024 Robert A. Gannon award for poetry dealing with Marine Corps life. He is currently serving as the vice president of the 1st Battalion, 25th Marines Association.

Melvin Ishmael Johnson

Melvin Ishmael Johnson was born in the Mississippi Delta on December 1, 1947, in Greenville, Mississippi and graduated from Coleman High School (1966). He served in the United States Marine Corps (1969-71). After being honorably discharged from the services, he attended Eastern Michigan University. In 1973, he Co-Founded the African Renaissance Theater Company of (Ypsilanti-Ann Arbor), Michigan. (1973-1980) with Darrell Dean, Josh Webb, and Robert Ingram.

At present he is the Director of Dramastage-Qumran Veterans Theater Workshop (dramastage-qumran.org). Author of plays: Surviving the Nickel, Catch the Tiger, Number One Recruit, Nail Heads, The Loyalty Oath, and The Emperor's Last Performance. Co-Author: The 101 Club with Judith Bowman and If the SHU Fits: Voices from Solitary Confinement with Andy Griggs. He developed the Anti-Violence Situation Coping Group as a conflict resolution group for military veterans and wrote three plays about military veterans, Nobody Told Us, The Hero Within, and Soldier to Soldier. In 2015, he performed the role of Lennox in the Robey Theatre production of The Magnificent Dunbar Hotel and in 2016, directed George Corbin's, Sabado Mornings. In 2019, he wrote and directed his play about Los Angeles Playwright Lynn Manning, Voice from The Village for the Hollywood Fringe Festival, and Bright New Day about the history of the historic Coleman High School, Greenville, Mississippi.

He has written a manual about how to put together a National Black History Theater Company entitled, Black History National Theater Manual, and recently finished his latest play and screenplay about the latter years of Paul Robeson and William Patterson entitled, Revolutionary Genocide. www.bymelpressllc.com

MEET THE WRITERS

Ken Klemm

Ken Klemm served in the U.S. Navy from 1985 to 1989, and spent three years on board the U.S.S. Claude V. Ricketts, DDG-5 as a Sonar Technician (STG). During that time he made a forward deployment on a six-month cruise of the Mediterranean, where he got to see France, Italy, Spain, Turkey, Egypt and Israel. He currently lives in Burns, Oregon and enjoys photography, writing and doomscrolling through animal themed videos on YouTube. He has been featured at Returning Soldiers Speak readings and is published in the organization's anthologies.

Gwyn LaRee

Gwyn LaRee is a Desert Storm era Marine Corps veteran who lives with multiple disabilities resulting from her service. She has been a professional actress since 2012 as well as an active volunteer in both the veteran and disability communities. Gwyn's membership includes the following: Disabled American Veterans (DAV), Marine Corps League, Veterans in Media & Entertainment (VME), the American Legion and Paralyzed Veterans of America (PVA). Working with her service dog, Simba, from 2010-2017 Gwyn promoted access and service dog acknowledgement across the United States in conjunction with America's VetDogs. Gwyn now lives in SW Washington state where she runs a small alpaca rescue and retirement home when she is not acting.

Kathleen Moorhead

Kathleen Moorhead served in the United States Air Force from 1979-1984 as a Staff Sergeant working on the C-130's inertial navigation systems. She has had readings of her plays performed in Florida, is a member of the Dramatists Guild, and an alumna of the Kennedy Center Playwriting Intensive. She's honored to represent the voice of a Captain (who was a Flight nurse during the Cold War to the Vietnam War) through her letters and to be included in the production of Across Time: Love & Humanity During War.

Lester Probst

Lester Probst served on the DMZ with the U.S. Army's 40th Infantry Division during the Korean Conflict from 1953-54. In 1959, he graduated from New York University as an electrical engineer. His first job was designing flight simulators, and he formed and led several computer companies until he retired in 2002. In 2004, after his wife retired from teaching they moved to Los Angeles. In 2014, he joined the American Legion, Hollywood Post 43 where he was introduced to creative writing by Returning Soldiers Speak. There he co-wrote with several veterans a two-act play that was workshopped and featured at ESTLA's 2019 Winterfest event, highlighting marginalized demographics to the community. Following that performance he began to workshop his own play, VOLUN-TEARs, which is about women in the military and Military Sexual Trauma. Then the pandemic shut everything down. During the pandemic, he joined various groups writing and performing both live and on zoom. He wrote monologues, performed a nine-minute comedy set, and co-wrote and acted in a two-minute film. At the end of the pandemic, the Veterans Empowerment Theater produced VOLUN-TEARs at the Blue Door Theater (the theatrical home ArtsUP! LA) in Culver City, California. There were seven shows, performed by a mostly military veteran cast and crew in late December 2022 and in early January 2023. Lester is also an active member of the Dramatist Guild of America and Veterans Empowerment Theater; a member/advisor of Veterans in Media and Entertainment; and a Board member of El Pueblo Park Association.

Glenn Schiffman

Glenn Schiffman was a Conscientious Objector during the Vietnam War. He studied for two years at the Ecumenical Institute San Francisco from 1968-1970. He was granted CO status by his draft board reserve colonel in a quid pro quo agreement with his father who was a minister, and who knew the colonel beat his wife. Glenn did not know about the agreement at the time. After serving two years as a CO, he was blacklisted by the FBI. He currently lives in Montana with his wife of many years and enjoys babysitting their two grandchildren. Glenn is a published writer and teacher.

Douglas Gabrielle (Director, Writer, & Lighting Designer)

Doug has been designing lights and acting for more than three decades, primarily in San Diego and Los Angeles. His L.A. Designs include: Pasadena Shakespeare Co: Comedy Of Errors, The Libertine, Othello; Sacred Fools: Don Juan In Chicago, Tell The Bees, Valparaiso, Caesar Chavez, Lights Out, Puzzler, Crumble-Lay Me Down Justin Timerlake, Absolutely Filthy; Porters of Hellsgate: Pericles, Prince of Tyre, Cymbeline (Valley Theatre Award Nominations for both); South Coast Repertory Theatre: Absolutely Filthy; L.A. Leilani Squire (Producer & Writer)

Leilani Squire is the daughter of LTJG Grant Robert Squire, who served thirty years in the United States Navy. She was born at Tripler Army Hospital in Honolulu while her father was deployed on an aircraft carrier during the Korean War, and raised in the military. She's CEO of Returning Soldiers Speak, 501(c)(3), whose mission is to empower veterans and their families to tell their stories to the community through the written word and live theater. She's an award-winning playwright, published writer, certified creativity coach, and member of EST/LA, Playwrights Unit, The Dramatist Guild, alumna of Kennedy Center Playwriting Intensive and EST/LA's The Ignite Project. She has been published in Smith & Krauss' 2023 Best 10-minute Plays and WE/US: Monologues for The Gender Minority. 15 Dead Souls won Veterans

Repertory Theater's inaugural 10-minute play competition and opened their 2023 Parlor Series. No Ordinary Mother was a finalist of The A Chronicles and first read in New York last Fall. Memorial Day is part of Grief Dialogues: The Play, with a reading scheduled in New York in November. One of her greatest honors is to be a part of this production and working with such wonderful and talented cast and crew.
